Last year we saw tremendous growth in our Frassati Young Adults, and there seems to be no sign of slowing down. People are drawn to authentic communities centered on Jesus, and our goal is simple: to be a community based around "being disciples together," and a welcoming place for new people.

Over the last year, we grew 35% in our social media subscriptions, and our emailed newsletter grew from 418 subscriptions (June 2022) to 768 (August 2023); that's 84% growth! This has translated into a steady stream of new faces at all our events, whether it be to our new evenings of *Praise and Adoration, Mass & Dinner, Lumen: Speaker & Pub Series*, or our trademark *Hike & Mass*. We also have expanding numbers of small groups, such as our *Pub & Board Game Night*, along with our traditional Bible studies. Our annual retreat sold out last Spring with some people sadly turned away, and our Christmas Party was a hit with over 200+ attendees, some flying from the East Coast specifically to attend. "There is no 'Seattle freeze' here" one person enthusiastically told me; "the best thing about Frassati is the community," said another. Clearly, we have a good thing going.

What contributed to this growth was our newly launched independent website (with help from former PM, Megan D'sa): frassatiseattle.org. We realized it was needed when we kept meeting people who held off joining our community because they thought it was only for UW students. Also, to keep up with our expansion, we hired another former Newman PM, Gizelle Gando, as part-time Assistant Director of Frassati. However, even between the two of us, nothing is possible without our volunteer leaders, especially our "Frassati Council" or volunteer board of directors. These were seven dedicated people who helped brainstorm and discuss the vision and trajectory of Frassati, and who also ran their own specific ministries/events along with their own teams of volunteers, plus helped on *ad hoc* committees for special events like the Christmas Party. These include Andrea Lim and Kristy Cooley on *Lumen*, Michael Fatina and Bruna Gabrielly on *Mass & Dinner*, Hung Nguyen on *Outdoor Ministry Team*, Conrad Reynoldson on *Social Events*, and Nick Holt on *Communications*.

We are looking forward to the 2023-2024 year, which begins with a retreat with a new Frassati council in September. We plan to continue to refine and polish what we already do, to introduce some new events like dances, and to expand our small groups. It's going to be a great year!

#### FOCUS MINISTRY: SHARING THE GOOD NEWS

FOCUS missionaries returned to UW for their fifth year of ministry! During the 22-23 year, we focused heavily on building up a thriving community. We hosted Sunday brunch after the 10am Mass every week, game nights, prayer nights and many other activities to better build up a strong community for our UW students to share the faith with their peers and live out the joy of the Gospel. Students and missionaries led Bible studies, reaching over 100+ souls each week. This year, two students, (Jency Clement and Kevin Paulsen) said "yes" to becoming FOCUS missionaries and will be sent to UC-Berkeley and Johns Hopkins, respectively, to share the Good News.

In January 2023, we took 25 students, with Fr Marcin and Br Michael Thomas, to FOCUS' national conference, SEEK, in St. Louis. At SEEK, our students were met with 20,000 other catholic college students from all over the country to hear talks from some of the best Catholic speakers in the world, participated in the sacraments, and fellowship. Many students left SEEK with greater conviction to live a life for God and share the faith with those around them.

In the spring of 2023, missionaries, Mitch and Nathan, with Fr Chrysostom, took 10 male students on a backpacking trip to Moab, Utah with CORE Missions. CORE is a group that challenges young people through rigorous activity while tying it into the faith. At the end of the school year, we said goodbye to missionaries Clare and Mitch Stephens after their two years of service at UW, and Ashley Potter after her four years of service at UW.

For the 23-24 school year, we are excited to welcome two first-year missionaries to our campus: Franz Jet Paronable, from Omaha, NE, and Benita Bheemisetty from Camarillo, CA. Nathan Lipinski will be returning for his second year on staff with FOCUS at UW. We are also welcoming a new team director: Kaylee Murphy from Hannibal, MO, this being her first year serving as a team director with FOCUS. We are excited to continue winning souls for Christ and building up His Kingdom at UW!

#### UNDERGRAD MINISTRY: YEAR-IN-REVIEW

This year, the undergraduate ministry continued the work of the previous year in revamping Newman Center activities after the COVID-19 pandemic. Both our Fall "Cast Out into the Deep" retreat and Winter SEARCH retreat were held to acclaim and were wonderful opportunities to be called deeper into our faith and community. In Spring Quarter, our men's ministry joined with the WWU Newman Center on a camping retreat in the Cascades. Our women's ministry, joined by students from SPU, held a retreat on a farm in Vashon Island. Aside from retreats, there were other opportunities for discernment, with multiple visits from Dominican sisters and priestly vocation directors.

Our holiday parties and Simbang Gabi festival helped our community grow in fellowship. The *Café Newman* talent show was one of our best yet, seeing participation from a wide range of different community members. Upstairs after the Sunday evening Masses, a fun new community event popped up called "Jam & Jams" that featured an assortment of breads and jam brought by participants, with music playing in the background (the "jams").

Living out a spirit of charity, students participated in more local volunteering opportunities such as building care packages and bringing undergraduates to serve at the Blessed Sacrament Sunday Dinners. For the first time in a while (if ever), we had students do volunteer outreach to seafarers at the Port of Seattle.

In addition to these events, undergraduates had opportunities to engage in intellectual formation. Our Evangelization and Outreach team held apologetics nights and co-hosted an interfaith panel on the ethics of Artificial Intelligence. This year, the UW Thomistic Institute chapter was founded on campus. While not officially tied to the Newman Center, it served as an outlet for intellectual formation for students who attended presentations by renowned speakers. Testimony nights and Bible studies also aided in the growth of knowledge and faith of our students.

At the end of the year, the undergraduate Student Ministry Team was involved in discussions of restructuring the ministry in hopes of finding a way to better serve the community. A more decentralized, project-based approach was chosen for the next academic year, where most of the existing committees would be disbanded and SMT members would be able to pursue individual projects focusing on a specific area of ministry. This new approach will allow for greater flexibility in addressing the community's needs.

This is just a cursory glance at all the fruit that came out of this year, and words cannot scratch the surface of the deeper bonds and interior lives that were fostered within the ministry. From regular events to FOCUS Bible studies to impromptu ultimate frisbee, there was always something to look forward to and a chance to grow deeper in faith and friendship.
